Part 1: General Information

Purpose of the Immunization Media Toolkit and Background on the District of Columbia's Immunization Requirements:

This immunization media toolkit can be used by schools, local education agencies (LEAs) and community-based organizations to share information in newsletters and on social media about the importance of immunizations, school immunization requirements and where families can go to get their child immunized. This media toolkit is designed to be used through the start of the school year and includes sample newsletters and social media posts that can be used on Twitter, Facebook, Instagram and other communication platforms used to reach District students and families. The images in this media kit are provided by DC Health and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). This toolkit also includes social media posts and images in recognition of National Immunization Awareness Month (NIAM) in August. To keep students healthy, in school and ready to learn, as well as to prevent the spread of infectious diseases, all students must be up to date on their required pediatric immunizations before the start of school. Schools should begin identifying non-compliant students now and informing families that they need to be up to date on their immunizations or risk removal from school next year. All students are required to be up to date on their immunizations to attend school, and students in pre-K 3, kindergarten, grade 7 and grade 11 will be temporarily removed from school until they come into compliance.

Schools may access the <u>School Immunization Policy</u>, training, frequently asked questions, flow charts, sample letters, best practices and resources on the <u>OSSE</u> <u>website</u>. This page also includes resources for families, including flyers, frequently asked questions and facts about immunizations. Also, the CDC has issued a <u>Call to Action</u>: What Schools Can Do to Promote Routine Vaccination Catch-Up Among School Aged Children with additional information and resources.

Schools are strongly encouraged to review the school immunization policy and supporting materials in the spring and summer of each year to begin notifying non-compliant families before the start of the new school year. It is important for families to schedule their immunization and well-child appointments in the spring and summer before the back-to-school rush.

Title: Immunizations are Required for School Attendance

Healthy bodies and minds are the foundation of academic success! Immunizations and regular visits to the doctor help protect students' health and readiness to learn. All students must be up to date on their routine pediatric immunizations or risk being removed from school. Take <u>steps</u> now to ensure your student is on track with immunizations!

The best place for a family to access <u>immunizations</u> is at their primary medical provider as part of a comprehensive well-child visit where the <u>Universal Health</u> <u>Certificate</u> is completed. If a family does not have a medical provider or they have difficulty securing an appointment, they can select one from a <u>list of pediatric</u> clinic locations in every ward.

Together we can ensure students are healthy and ready to learn by protecting them and our community against infectious disease. Secure all necessary immunizations and submit health forms to school before the first day! Post 1.3 DC Health: Back-to-school vaccines and SBHCs

Text: School-Based Health Centers are currently open to all students to get the vaccines they need for school. Post 1.4 DC Health and OSSE: Take steps to get ready for the school year

Text: All DC students must be up to date on their immunizations before next school year!

Post 1.5 DC Health: Health forms

Post 1.7 CDC: Vaccines are safe and effective



Post 1.8 CDC: Return to school with vaccinations




Post 1.10 CDC: Healthy bodies and minds

Post 2.2 NIAM: Immunization schedule








Post 2.4 NIAM: Vaccines are safe and effective

Text: Vaccines work with your child's natural defenses to help them safely develop protection from diseases. Vaccines are tested to ensure they are safe and effective, even after they are in use. Post 2.5 NIAM: Importance of herd immunity

Post 2.6 NIAM: Vaccines protect

Text: Vaccines are required for school! Vaccine-preventable diseases are still a threat. Since 2010, CDC has seen between 10,000-50,000 cases of whooping cough each year. Whooping cough can cause serious complications for children and teenagers. bit.ly/DCvax #ivax2protect
